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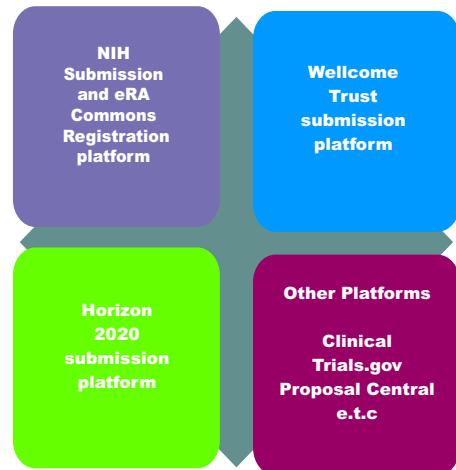

The activities started with the Early Career Researchers' Day which was planned and executed entirely by the undergraduate, postgraduate and professional students in the College of Medicine, mentored by Dr. Uchendu of the Department of Community Medicine. There were motivational lectures on the benefits of mentoring and preparedness for a research career. The second day featured fireside chats on "Bridging the innovation divide" and "Intellectual property rights" The introduction of social media for live streaming of the events and interactions was quite innovative. The intellectual property rights session was particularly exciting as it showed most researchers the benefits for academic and financial rewards. The grand finale was the lecture by Professor Martin Emeje, Distinguished Professor of Drug Delivery/Nanomedicine, Nigerian Institute of Pharmaceutical Research and Development (NIPRID) on developing innovative ideas for career advancement. The presence of staff from Lagos State, Olabisi Onabanjo and Babcock Universities added to the glamour of the event and the external reach of the benefits of CRIM. We appreciated all our collaborators and sponsors. We continue to learn from these experiences and promise to improve on our performance.

CRIM has an off shoot: A College of Medicine Research Innovation Hub (CRIH). It is run by highly motivated students and the group is very active. This year's event commenced with a day dedicated to, and organized by, early career researchers (undergraduates, post graduates and resident doctors) in the College of Medicine and the University College Hospital. The event was chaired by the Deputy Provost of the College, Professor Obafunke Denloye. In her charge, the Deputy Provost encouraged early career researchers to be creative and involved in innovative research which makes impact on the society at large. This was followed by speeches delivered by selected upwardly mobile early career researchers on the overview of research, their journey as early career researchers and pathways to conducting innovative researches. Emphasis was laid on the importance of having mentors as well as the need for willpower and determination in pursuit of careers as researchers. Researchers with the best abstracts in each of the following categories: - undergraduates, postgraduates and professionals, delivered oral presentations on their abstracts and a total of seventy-one (71) accepted abstracts were presented at the poster stands.

The second day of the event, tagged “Innovation and Social Event Day”, featured a fire-side chat with two (2) interactive sessions chaired by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor Research, Innovation and Strategic Partnership, University of Ibadan, Professor Olanike Adeyemo, represented by the Director Research Management Office, Professor A.S. Jegede. The fireside chats which focused on “Bridging the Innovation Divide” and “Intellectual Property Rights” were anchored by Professor Oye Gureje and Dr. Opeyemi Sigbeku respectively. Researchers were admonished to engage with “the town” to understand what problem is worth solving in order to commercialize their research outcomes and also encouraged to be diligent and resolute on patenting their researches.

The grand finale was chaired by Professor Abel Idowu Olayinka, Vice Chancellor, University of Ibadan who was represented by Professor E. Oluwabunmi Olapade-Olaopa, the Provost of the College of Medicine, University of Ibadan. The day featured a keynote presentation by Professor Martins Emeje, Head Technology Innovation and Support Centre, NIPRD, Abuja, innovation pitches, goodwill messages from friends of the University, presentation of awards, exhibitions by researchers and industries and poster presentations of all accepted abstracts.

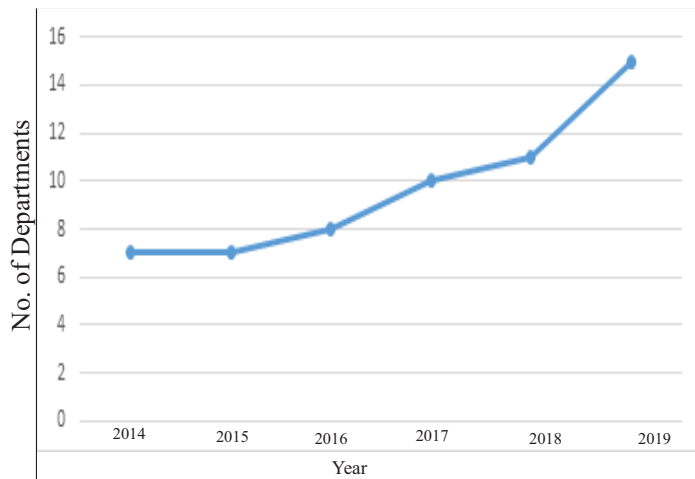


Fig 1: Annual Number Of Departments with research grants in COMUI

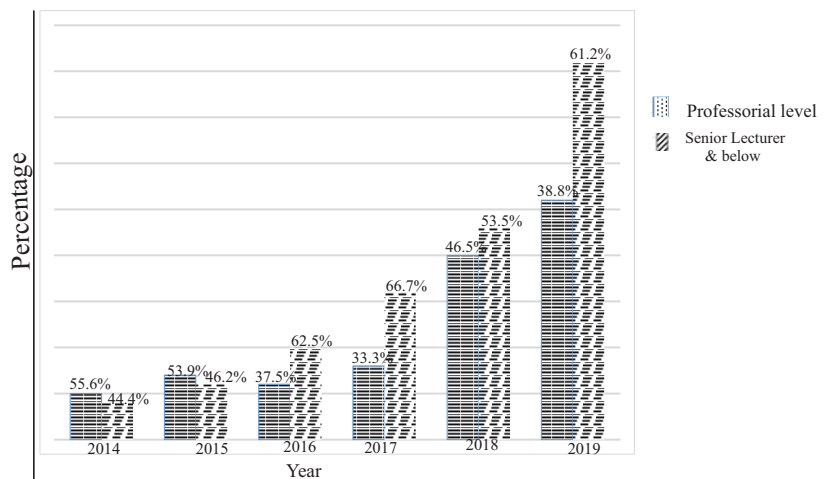


Fig 2: Annual new & ongoing grants

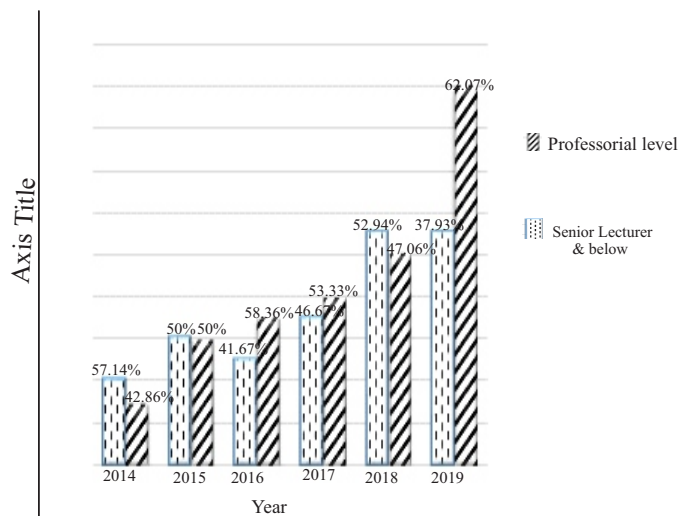


Fig 3: Annual New Grants

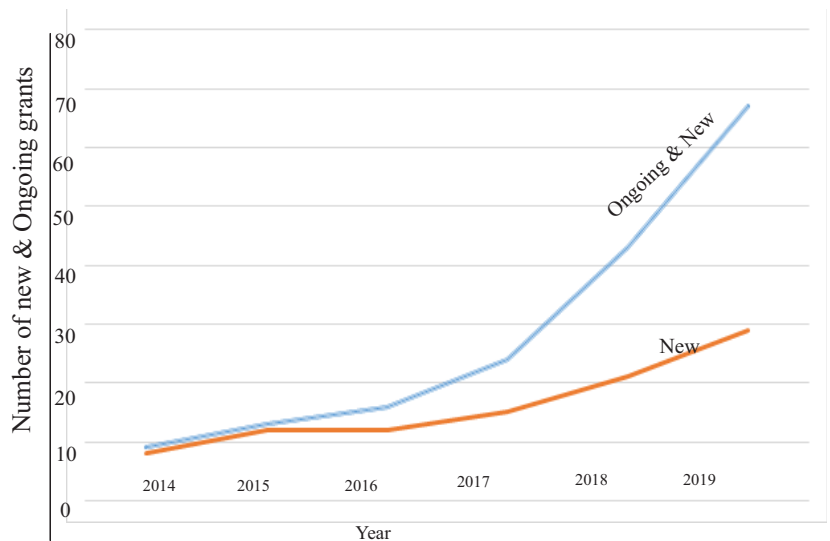


Fig 4: Number of grant (new & ongoing) domiciled in COMUI
